SUCCESS AT THE CRAB FEED LOOKS A LITTLE DIFFERENT THIS YEAR

If you were at this year's Crab Feed Fundraiser, you may have noticed some changes.

This was the first Crab Feed in a long time without Steve Gwinn. After years of leading the organization's effort, Steve retired from the event this year. "Each year, Steve would spend over one hundred hours in securing donations and organizing the event," said executive director Brian Burns. "We can't thank Steve enough for his work in making the Crab Feed what it has become."

We'll admit that we were a little intimidated at hosting such a big event without our expert, and by the challenge of providing a worthwhile event.

Maybe fear is a good motivator. Our board of directors and staff really went to work on finding donations from supporters in the community for the raffle and auctions. They were able to bring in original art, an Alaska salmon fishing trip, a trail bike, lodging at Cannon Beach, patio furniture, local wine, WSU football game tickets, and a handmade quilted blanket among other live and silent auction items.

A second change, in response to Steve's departure, was to make the event smaller this year by selling

fewer tickets. The typical attendance in recent years was around 500 people. This year's attendance was a comfortable 242.

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SALMON IN SCHOOL IS OUT FOR SUMMER

The arrival of hot June days signaled the end of the school year and a bounty of salmon releases throughout our area. Nine schools with over 200 students and staff released 820 spring chinook salmon into Columbia and Snake River tributaries.

About 100 of these were electronically tagged with help from the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, allowing us to track their movement and mortality on their journey to the ocean.

Walla Walla High School released their salmon into Yellowhawk Creek at the Walla Walla High School campus, while Nueva Esperanza Leadership Academy, Prescott, and Touchet schools all released their salmon into the Touchet River.

Mill Creek was our most popular release location, with Davis, Rogers Adventist, John Sager, and Walla Walla High School Opportunity program all releasing salmon near the community college campus.

Pomeroy 4th grade, which finished their very first year raising salmon, made the release an all-day field trip along the Tucannon River, with a visit to Tucannon Hatchery and then enjoying lunch near Camp Wooten.

Each salmon was given words of encouragement and good wishes for the long, arduous journey ahead of them. Many students didn't want to see them go, as the salmon had become important members of the classroom community, requiring daily feedings and monitoring.

As summer now winds down, we are gearing up for the new school year ahead. A new batch of salmon eggs will arrive this fall from the Umatilla and South Fork Walla Walla hatchery facilities, ready to start the process over again.

We will be welcoming three new classrooms to the program this fall: Waitsburg, Dixie-Starbuck, and a second tank in Touchet for their 4th grade classroom. With a little luck and diligent monitoring, we should be releasing over 1,000 salmon next spring!

With the growth of the program, we are looking for volunteers to help out with Salmon in School - a few hours a week to assist with lessons or to help monitor and clean tanks in the spring.
